Unit: 3

Contemporary History: View points. Economic, Political, Administrative, Social, Cultural, Health, Education.

Contemporary sources. Journalistic, Reports, Documents, Biographies, Letters, Web. Recognising historical facts from contemporary sources.

Unit: 4

Identifying a Unit for writing history. Family, Street, Village, Public office, Place, Monument, Organisation.

Information to be collected. Calculations and measurements required to be made.

Unit: 5

Writing of History of a Unit: Choosing a unit. Aspects to be studied in the Field. Methods of information collection, Preparation of rough figures/maps. Structure of a History document.

- 4. Suggested Format for Field work: *Title page, student details, contents page, introduction, work done, findings, conclusions and acknowledgements.*
- 5. Unit tests (IE).

- 1. Training of students by a related field expert.
- 2. Assignments (including technical assignments like identifying sources of history, separating facts from legends, compilation of historical facts in a proper order, judging their authenticity, taking measurements, doing calculations and drawing rough figures/maps needed for writing history of a unit)
